Created to Be Authentic

God recognizes and cherishes our true selves. We don't need to change who we are to fit some person's or group's ideal. God created us to be our individual selves. The story of sisters Mary and Martha in chapter 10 of the book of Luke is a vivid illustration of how Jesus sees value and worth in each one of us. God's love isn't reserved for a select few, with stipulations about who we love, how we move, or what language we speak. Our unique talents and gifts join together seamlessly to make up one body of faith.

Created to Be Brave

Created to Be Disciples

It can be uplifting and fulfilling to share our joyous moments with each other, but what about those not-so-great times? When we lean on each other and encourage one another, everyone feels lighter. It can be easier to share burdens with people we know well—friends, relatives, people who look like us and share the same spaces and beliefs. But what would discipleship look like if we were to truly share God's love as put forth in John 15:12, "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you"?

Created to Be Disruptive

Love for our neighbors can be exhibited in myriad ways—some so easy to carry out, we might even do so automatically without giving it much thought. But sometimes showing that love and discipleship can be a bit more challenging. Speaking up in support of another person or group being hurt by unfair rules or situations can be a very powerful way to walk beside our siblings in Christ.

As you begin your week, be encouraged by the words from Galatians 5:22–23: "By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things."
