WHERE FAITH, FRIENDSHIP, AND ADVENTURE UNITE: THE SUMMER CAMP EXPERIENCE

It was the last week of summer camp in 2023. The family campers at Kirchenwald were walking back from a morning of play at Buzzard's Rocks and Anne Confer Martens was enjoying a conversation with another parent when she realized her two sons were no longer walking beside her. But her realization was not a moment of panic, rather one of great appreciation. In her words, "I knew they were fine. They had just run ahead in excitement. But you don't worry about that stuff when you're at camp because you know there are other families and great counselors that you trust who genuinely care about your kids. They care about everyone. It's one of the things that has always stood out to me at camp."

Anne, her husband Eric, and their sons Andrew and Timmy have been family campers for years now.

"Camp is a safe environment in so many ways," Eric said.

"Physically safe, but also a place that's safe to explore and take kids outside their comfort zones. They can grow and learn about the world, about nature, about God, their friends, and themselves." An emphasis on both community and personal growth has always

been central to the camp experience at Kirchenwald and Nawakwa. It's why we continue a practice of small group living, free from distractions like technology. In these settings, campers come to more fully experience life together and are afforded time and space for reflection. "One of the things we talk about at my school is



what's being called the epidemic of loneliness," said Anne. "Coming out of the COVID years everyone was so separated. But the atmosphere at camp is all about being in community together. It's a core value there. So we choose to be together."

LEGACY AND REMEMBRANCES OF FAITHFUL SERVICE

What do Beth Fogleman, Ron and Kathy Kerr, and Pr. Conrad and Winnie Youse have in common? All have blessed LCC with a history and legacy of faithful, committed, and generous service. And, although Beth, Kathy, Ron, Winnie, and Pastor are no longer the fixtures at camp which they once were, they remain committed to the ministry and also remain beloved for all they have given over their many years at the camps. Each has truly been a blessing to LCC ministry!

After being a Nawakwa camper in her youth, Beth served at Nawakwa, Kirchenwald, and Wittel Farm for 39 summers from 1974 through 2022, taking several summers away from camp to raise children. She served in various roles, including kitchen staff, counselor, Nawakwa head cook, Kirchenwald head cook and Wittel Farm Summer Day Program director.

Kathy worked alongside Beth in Nawakwa's kitchen from 1991 - 1994 before becoming the head cook and food service manager in 1995, serving in that role through 2023. That's 31 years of service!

Ron, a Nawakwa camper in his youth, served on summer camp staff as a counselor. In 1994 he joined the year-round staff as Nawakwa's maintenance director, a position he held into 2022 before taking a more part-time role. Ron served Nawakwa for over 28 years!

From 1969 - 1976, Pr. Youse was Kirchenwald's first director. From 1976 - 2000 he was LCC's first Executive Director. In 2021 he transitioned into the role of Kirchenwald maintenance director, a position he held into 2023. That's 54 years of service!

Winnie developed and led Kirchenwald's nature craft program from 1969 - 2022 while also running the summer camp office. She occasionally cooked for retreat groups, cared for the camp goats, and tended the camp garden. That's 53 years of service!

We wanted to know:

What is your favorite memory from camp?

Ron: "I have too many to pick just one, but I'd say it is the people I got to know and share time with."

Kathy: "Having 5 grandchildren working in camp with us last summer."

Beth: "Riding with Matt (her husband) in the golf cart turned 'ice cream truck' complete with music playing, to deliver hand-cranked ice cream to campers after Capture the Flag."

Pr. Youse: "The first day Kirchenwald's newly-constructed

pool opened in the summer of 1979."

Winnie: "Seeing campers smile when they complete a craft from natural materials."

What is something at camp that you have seen endure the test of time?

Pr. Youse: "Camp is a place where God is always present for everyone."

Winnie: "The craft cabin always being a happy place for the campers."

Ron: "There is always something that needs attention or needs to be fixed."

Kathy: "Campers know what day of the week it is by the breakfast menu."

Beth: "Friday night worship is so meaningful."

What surprised you?

Winnie: "We never ran out of the clay, which we dug out of the stream bank, and used for pottery."

Pr. Youse: "How the weather has become hotter and wetter and seeing the forest change because of it."

Kathy: "Seeing campers develop a liking for roasted vegetables in recent years."

Ron: "How much campers changed and matured as they came back to camp year after year."

Beth: "How much fun it was having my own children working for me in the kitchen."

What are your favorite 3 camp foods?"

Beth: "Baked oatmeal, grilled cheese sandwich and tomato soup, chicken Kiev."

Kathy: "Chili and rice, peanut butter cake, zucchini quiche."

Ron: "Chicken cheese steak, turkey and filling, meatloaf."

Winnie: "Baked oatmeal, sticky buns, pit dinner."

Pr. Youse: "Home-made ice cream, campfire hot dogs, grilled cheese sandwich and tomato soup."

THE SUMMER CAMP EXPERIENCE

"I hope that my kids find a connection to their identity at camp," said Eric. "It's a place to explore that with staff who are role models for them. To try new things. Maybe even try a new food," he added, with a smile.

In addition to the fun activities, the camp experience at Kirchenwald and Nawakwa is grounded in a Christian faith. Through regular worships, Bible studies, and devotions, messages of God's love are incorporated into every part of the camp experience. "Faith formation doesn't just happen on Sundays at church," said Anne. "At camp my kids live in a place where Christ is the center of everything

that happens. They get to see faith practices in all aspects of life - not being siloed off on their own. It's woven into everything. I remember when I was a camper I knew I was about to have Bible study when we'd randomly sit down in the middle of the woods after playing a game. It was just part of the routine of the day. And it connected to everything else we were doing."

Andrew and Timmy have reached the age where, in addition to Family Camp, they now also come to other weeks of camp, apart from their parents. "I really like Sunday night worship," said Andrew. "You walk out to the lake and it's so chill and peaceful. On the first night it helps (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

me feel really welcome. And the chocolate chip cookies are really good," he added. Memories like these stand out for many kids who get some of their first tastes of independence at camp. "Eric and I love camp," said Anne. "And while we don't want to force our kids to love it, we want to respect their boundaries, we believe so deeply that camp is important. It meets kids where they are and it's a place where you learn that God loves you. There aren't many places in the world like that - places where you can be radically welcomed just as you are." Wanting to make sure his voice was heard, too, Timmy added, "And capture the flag is really fun."

GROWING PROJECT SET TO BEGIN ITS NINTH SEASON

"Out of the ground the LORD God made to grow every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for food, the tree of life also in the midst of the garden, and the tree of knowledge of good and evil." Genesis 2:9.

"On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations." Revelation 22:2.

From beginning to end, trees are a present symbol of life and renewal in the Bible. Even the cross itself reveals to us that our path includes both death and resurrection, symbolized by the seasonal and annual rhythm of the trees. This year, we will contemplate the significance of trees at the farm, in our lives, and for the earth. We will be planting some native trees this spring, too!

The winter is coming to an end and spring buds and leaves are just around the corner. At the Wittel Farm that means plans and preparations for another growing season are underway! So, what can you anticipate in 2024?

The season will officially kick off this year with a special Earth Day Planting Day on April 20th with a blessing of the seeds, soils, trees, plants, birds, and insects. Join us at 9:00 am for a short service of blessing followed by some planting time.

Volunteers can sign up for Saturdays in March, April, and May. The spring season involves a lot of planting, both seeds and plants. Starting the week of June 9th, a regular weekly rhythm of Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays will begin again for volunteers. Each day, we will have farm chores, education, and fun in community. We begin at 9:00 am and end each day



by 3:00 pm. Volunteers may determine their arrival and departure times between 9:00 and 3:00. Please, as always, wear appropriate closed-toed footwear. Gloves, hats, and water bottles are recommended. Annual waivers are available on the website and SignUp Genius.

This year, we are offering three special events on the farm called Summer Eco-Education Days (SEED). On June 8, July 6, and August 10 from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm we will hold lunch-and-learn events for kids and adults. We will learn about the various practices of regenerative agriculture and explore the impact they are having on the farm. We will learn about soil health, composting, cover cropping, biodiversity, and the ways we are implementing a model of ecological farming to protect the earth and grow healthy food to share. We may even learn how to process our elderberries into jam and wine! Lunch will be provided and the cost is \$10.00.

We continue to expand both crop diversity and distribution partners. We hope to grow more volunteers this season, too! We look forward to seeing you on the farm in 2024.
